

The Spanish Inquisition



The idea of an Inquisition was not of Spanish origin. The Holy Office existed long before the creation of the Spanish Inquisition and operated in many countries other than Spain. It originated as a special court, created by the pope, for the detection, trial and punishment of heresy, and it was first established by Pope Gregory IX in 1233 to deal with the Albigensian heresy in southern France. Its aim was to convert the heretic as well as to punish him, and in matters of heresy the local bishops now had to defer to the new tribunal; but it was more than a court of law, for the inquisitor was an investigator as well as a judge and had police functions as well as judicial ones.
