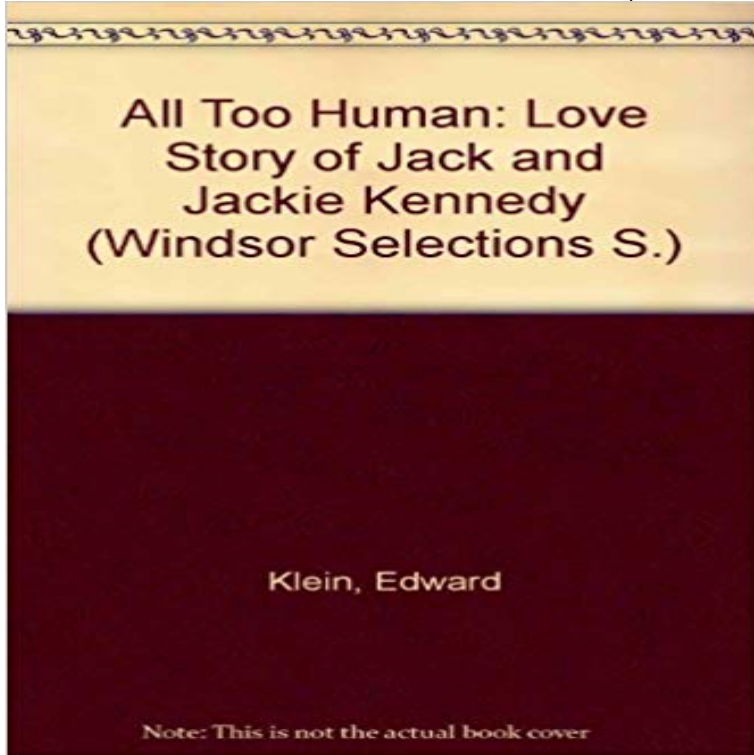


All Too Human: The Love Story of Jack and Jackie Kennedy

Did the enormous strains of the presidency-- and the tragic death of their infant son Patrick-- draw Jack and Jackie closer together?
